

Bicycle Rider Struck and Killed by Driver in Houston Park

The attorneys of 1-800-Car-Wreck discuss a recent Houston car accident in which a cyclist was struck and killed.

HOUSTON, TX, USA, September 3, 2013 /EINPresswire.com/ -- A bicycle rider was killed after being hit by a car in Memorial Park. According to a [report by KHOU about the accident](#), the cyclist was attempting to cross a road at an intersection when he was struck by the driver of an older model Chevrolet Impala that was traveling in the same direction and failed to stop in enough time to avoid hitting the rider. The incident was reported to have occurred around 7:30 p.m.

The cyclist was pronounced dead at the scene after being thrown several feet off of his bike. Following the collision with the rider, the car purportedly ran into a light pole, and the driver was subsequently transported to the hospital. His condition was unknown at the time of the KHOU report.

An investigation into the accident is ongoing. No charges have been filed in connection with the case.

Accidents between bicycles and cars occur regularly as a result of a driver's failure to acknowledge the rights of cyclists on roadways, according to the [Houston accident injury lawyers of 1-800-Car-Wreck](#).

Bicyclists who become injured as a result of a collision with a motor vehicle may have valid grounds for [bringing forth a personal injury](#) claim. The relatives of injured accident victims who are killed as a result of these types of accidents may also have grounds to file a claim for legal compensation for resulting damages that have been incurred.
