In fact, preventable hospital errors were ranked sixth on the list, with an estimated 98,000 people dying each year as a result of these kinds of medical mistakes.

Despite the alarming statistics, the progress made by hospitals in reducing the number of patients who acquire an infection, injury, or other serious medical issue during their hospital stay is stated to have been relatively slow.

"While hospitals have made progress, medical mistakes still occur at an alarming rate. The incidence rate of medical harm occurring is estimated to be over 40,000 per day according to the Institute for Healthcare Improvement. [2] For example, The Joint Commission, a nonprofit agency that certifies health care organizations, reports that only 89% of the facilities surveyed in 2008 met the patient safety goal for following the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) hand hygiene guidelines for preventing the spread of infection. "The Medicaid list of what is preventable mirrors the Medicare list, which includes transfusing the wrong blood type; falls that result in dislocation, fractures, or head injuries; burns and electric shocks; catheter-associated urinary tract infections; surgical site infections after bariatric surgery or coronary artery bypass; and manifestations of poor glycemic control."
