Wale, like Pac, is able to create songs with meaning, depth and soul while still connecting to a mainstream fan base. Just like his legendary predecessor, Wale has a song for everyone – college chics, dudes in the trap, professionals, old people and young. And like Pac, whoever listens to his music is somehow changed for the better – resurrected to a higher level of consciousness.

In an interview, Rick Ross recounted how Wale is in the game for the love of music, not the love of money. Almost everything he does shows that his fans comes first. Regardless of how full his schedule may be, he makes a priority to connect with his audience in a personal way.

In his own words:

As much as I don't want to admit it, my fans are the only ones that can hurt my feelings when they're not pleased with what I'm presenting. I want it to be perfect for them. I want them to have a different sense of pride in my music.

Gifting a young woman with a \$25,000 college scholarship

Acting as an advocate for black women. Wale has said:

"The most horrible feeling in the world was that my women think that I don't care about them. I'd rather go broke than for my black women to think that I don't care about them. I would rather lose everything than to have my queens think I'm turning my back on them."

Let's face it. Tupac was dope as hell, by far one of the greatest of all times. Still, while everyone is given their proper respects in death, when Pac was alive haters were running rampant.
