Spring break ideas

1. One Theme Project

Choose one theme to photograph and look for new angles, perspectives and lighting for inspiration. Once the collection is complete, displaying the images in the home is key for instilling a feeling of achievement and pride in the kids.

2. The Family Project

Seek out opportunities to photograph family members in meaningful ways. Portraits that reflect the character and personality of a loved one will be treasured for generations to come.

3. The Story Project

Take pictures to illustrate scenes from a favourite story or fairytale. Ask friends to join in to help with costumes, props, and modeling to make it a full scale production.

4. The Social Issue Project

Share thoughts and opinions on a community, neighbourhood or school issue through photographs. Submit the photos and articles to a local newsletter or newspaper to spread the word.

5. The Art Gallery Project

Visit an art gallery and reflect on the techniques used by artists using other mediums. Inspiration from other artists is invaluable in exploring one's own creativity.

6. The About Me Project

Follow a list of photographs to take that represent one's self at this particular point in time. Repeating this project a year or two down the road will provide lots of opportunity for conversation and memories.

7. The Teaching Project

Create a series of images to teach and to help others learn a process. A set of images or video, like you see on Pinterest, is an ideal way to share ideas.

8. How I See It Challenge

Get inspired on a weekly basis for the rest of the year by joining the How I See It photography challenge for kids.

Janet says, "These eight spring break projects are a perfect launch pad for the minds and imaginations of kids to kick into high gear. I want the camera to be a tool for them to express themselves in their vision of their life. They can show what delights, excites, bothers or motivates them exactly as they see it. Sometimes they just need a starting point to take off from."
