

Organic Cotton Doesn't Mean That There is No Environmental Impact

White organic cotton is often subjected to toxic processing and dyes. The way to avoid these chemicals is to use cotton that is grown already colored.

With the invention of cheap industrial dyes natural colors of organic cotton became obsolete. It is only with the understanding of how toxic dyes and bleaches affect us and our children that natural cotton colours have made a resurgence. The last 20 years has seen natural cotton developed to a point where it can be used in modern manufacturing as opposed to hand spun.

Non organic cotton is one of the most pesticide heavy crops on the planet.



Organic cotton by contrast is inherently resistant to bugs and hence has far less impact on the environment.

The bright colors often used to dye white organic cotton do not stay put and can be absorbed into the skin or washed away into the water supply.

Many organic cotton products are available in the market place, but the majority of them have started out as white organic cotton and hence still use dyes to achieve the color they want. Companies also tend to combine the cotton with other synthetic products such as polyester, which defeats the purpose entirely.

A new company in the market place, Monkey Around Baby, have gone the extra mile to use 100% naturally colored cotton with no synthetic fibers and no toxic dyes. Further to that they have eschewed the typical plastic packaging and opted for a recyclable cardboard gift box.
