

Sanding Hardwood Floors Is Better Left to Professionals, Says Milwaukee Restoration Company

Sanding hardwood floors is a challenging project that requires experience and performance tools.

However, unless homeowners have some experience in the field, choosing to do it without professional help can end up with damaged floors and higher costs. "When planning a hardwood floor refinishing project, the main concern is cost," says Keith Allman, Royal Wood Floors owner. "That is why we often join forces with homeowners and come in



only for that part of the project that requires both experience and high-quality tools. We have seen sanding projects gone wrong too many times, so we recommend hiring professional wood floor refinishers for this stage of the restoration process. Once the floor is correctly sanded and ready to receive the stain or finish, homeowners have more chances of success when completing the last stages of refinishing. This way, the project ends up with excellent results and a smaller price tag."

Sanding consists of removing the sealer and the uppermost layer of the wood boards in order to get rid of damages or imperfections and prepare the wood for the stain. The tool for the job is the sander - a large, heavy and noisy machine that uses a sanding drum to abrade the floor and is not exactly easy to maneuver correctly.

In fact, with sanding, the problem is often the improper use of the machine, which has to be moved around the floor in a steady fashion, yet is difficult to control. Rushing through the job, applying too much pressure on the handles or losing control over the machine create drum marks, waves or other imperfections that will become even more conspicuous when the stain and finish is applied. Pausing in one spot can lead to dips or holes in the boards and uneven floors.

But even if the hardwood floor owner takes the time to do everything right, the quality of the machine may not be up to standards. Rental sanders are often abused, lower-quality pieces of machinery that may not yield the best results even in the hands of an experienced wood floor refinisher. In addition, choosing the wrong sand paper may pose other problems. In trying to be gentle to the floor, the homeowner may use a finer grit or not sand the floor enough, which later causes the stain to absorb poorly.


