


What I Wish People Told Me Before I decided to be an Actor with Dalyboy Hyppolite

-Let the movies be your school

This doesn't mean to skip acting school entirely - <u>acting lessons</u> are of extreme importance, especially the basics - but one of the best ways of learning is by mimicking others, in particular those who are masters at the craft. By watching films and other media, you can take note of what the experts do and apply it to your own acting. The best part about this is the diversity that you can encounter simply by going to the cinema. And you don't have to limit yourself to just the acting either. Films present the opportunity for studying writing, acting, direction, set design and every other discipline attached to film.

-Don't avoid networking

"You might be slightly awkward at parties and you might not feel like going out all the time," Says

Dalyboy Hyppolite. "But networking is of vital importance if you're going to make it in the acting game." It's important to meet other people in the industry, to get them asking, "who is this person?" Oftentimes, in many industries all over the world, it's about who you know and not what you know.
