The United Nations launched their human rights awareness campaign under the banner of <u>#StandUp4HumanRights</u> in December of 2016. This year's Youth for Human Rights DC march will be supporting that same theme.

Adopted 70 years ago on December 10, 1948, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights was compiled as a result of the egregious human rights abuses perpetrated during the Second World War. With the end of that war,

and the creation of the United Nations, the international community vowed never to allow

atrocities of that kind to ever happen again.

Youth for Human Rights DC's march is part of a global series of events happening in many cities across the US as well as countries around the world in celebration of Human Rights Day 2018. From California to Copenhagen, Washington DC to Taipei, similar marches will be happening across the globe to celebrate this day and the anniversary of the UDHR.
