

New Mexico US Navy Veterans Lung Cancer Advocate Urges the Friends of a Navy Veteran with Lung Cancer in New Mexico to Call the Lawyers at Karst von Oiste About Compensation-If He had Asbestos Exposure in the Service

The Advocate says, "Most Navy Veterans or people who had significant exposure to asbestos and developed lung cancer are not aware the \$30 billion dollar-asbestos trust funds were set up for them too. If your loved one died of lung cancer and he was exposed to asbestos in the navy within the last year, please call the lawyers at the law firm of Karst von Oiste at 800-714-0303 anytime to discuss possible significant compensation. The asbestos exposure had to have taken

Typically, the exposure to asbestos occurred in the 1960's, 1970's, or 1980's. www.karstvonoiste.com/


or while working at a factory, at power plant, public utility, or as a plumber, electrician welder, mechanic or any kind of skilled trades group in any state please have them call us anytime at 800-714-0303. Most people like this never get compensated-even though the asbestos trust funds were set up for them too. According to the American Cancer Society for nonsmokers who have been exposed to asbestos in their workplace the risk of lung cancer is five times that of unexposed workers. <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/cancer/lung/statistics/index.htm">https://www.cdc.gov/cancer/lung/statistics/index.htm</a>.

States with the highest incidence of lung cancer include Kentucky, West Virginia, Maine, Tennessee, Mississippi, Ohio, Indiana, Louisiana, Arkansas, Missouri, North Carolina, Rhode Island, Alabama, and Delaware.

However, asbestos exposure lung cancer can happen in any state including California, New York, Texas, Florida, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Wyoming, Utah, Montana, Idaho, Arizona, Washington, Oregon or Alaska. <a href="https://www.karstvonoiste.com/">www.karstvonoiste.com/</a>
