

Rhode Island US Navy Veterans Lung Cancer Advocate Urges a Navy Veteran with Lung Cancer in Rhode Island to Call the Lawyers at Karst von Oiste-If They Had Asbestos Exposure in the Navy-Compensation May Exceed \$100,000

PROVIDENCE , RHODE ISLAND, USA, January 4, 2021 /EINPresswire.com/ -- The Rhode Island US Navy Veterans Lung Cancer Advocate says, "We are urging a Navy Veteran with lung cancer in Rhode Island or their family to please call the lawyers at Karst von Oiste at 800-714-0303---if the Veteran had significant exposure to asbestos on a navy ship, submarine or a shipyard. Financial compensation for a person like this might exceed \$100,000 and the financial claim does not involve suing the navy. Most people like this never get compensated because they do not realize the \$30 billion dollar-asbestos trust funds were set up for them too.

"If the Navy Veteran we have described sounds like a member of the VFW, American legion or a friend please ask their wife or adult son-daughter to call the lawyers at Karst von Oiste at 800-714-0303. The typical person we are trying to help is in their 60s or 70s and their asbestos exposure took place prior to 1982. It does not matter if they smoked cigarettes."

High-risk work groups for exposure to asbestos in Rhode Island include US Navy Veterans, civilian employees at Naval Station Newport, power plant workers, shipyard workers, maritime workers, oil refinery workers, industrial workers, public utility workers, plumbers, electricians, auto mechanics, machinists, welders, insulators, or construction workers. Typically, the exposure to asbestos occurred in the 1950's, 1960's, 1970's, or 1980's. www.karstvonoiste.com/
