This remarkable collection, created by artist Daniel Borja Ramirez , spans twelve sections and depicts the rich history and diverse cultures of Indigenous women across North America.

The exhibition showcases the evolution of the project, beginning with "Women of the Great Lakes" (2006-2007), which was featured at the National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI) in Washington D.C. Subsequent sections highlight themes such as "One Woman - One Tribe," cultural education, Pueblo traditions, Indigenous presence in all 50 states, Oklahoma tribes, the impact of Route 66, the Lewis and Clark expedition, Indigenous women in leadership, Arizona tribes, and Indigenous women artists. The most recent section focuses on Northeastern tribes.

Daniel's work captures the strength, resilience, and artistry of Native American women,
