"It's easy to think you won't get bit," said Nathan Grundy, "but with Wisconsin having 6,379 cases of Lyme disease in 2023 - the highest on record - the numbers suggest that

tick bites are increasing, not decreasing which means prevention is key to enjoying the outdoors." (Source: WI Dept. of Health Services). To help prevent tick bites, it's important to follow some important steps and they include:

- Avoid tick bites by hiring a tick remediation company
