characteristics and maintenance requirements. Homeowners should request clear explanations regarding material lifespan, wind resistance ratings, impact resistance classifications, and compatibility with existing roof structures.

Ventilation design is frequently overlooked during roofing discussions. Proper attic ventilation supports temperature regulation and moisture control. In colder climates, inadequate ventilation can contribute to ice dam formation, which may lead to interior water damage. Contractors should evaluate ridge vents, soffit vents, and insulation levels to ensure balanced airflow.
