Kathy L. Scherler, Ph.D., is an accomplished educator, mentor, and leadership coach with more than two decades of experience spanning teaching, educational administration, and professional development. Her career began in public education as a music educator, where she taught students from Pre-K through 12th grade, inspiring creativity, confidence, and a lifelong love of learning. This early foundation in student engagement and artistic expression shaped her enduring commitment to mentorship, leadership development, and educational transformation.



Dr. Scherler holds a Ph.D. in Music Education from the University of North Texas, along with superintendent and principal certifications from The University of Texas at Arlington. Throughout her leadership journey, Dr. Scherler has played a pivotal role in designing and launching transformative academic initiatives. She co-founded the International Baccalaureate Program at Woodrow Wilson High School in Dallas ISD, as well as the I.M. Terrell Academy for STEM and Visual and Performing Arts in Fort Worth, Texas—the city's first dedicated high school for visual and performing arts. These initiatives reflect her long-standing commitment to

academic excellence, equity, and the creation of rigorous, inclusive learning environments.

In addition to her work in K–12 education, Dr. Scherler spent a decade as a higher education professor, preparing future music educators for teacher certification. In this role, she focused on developing the next generation of teachers by combining instructional expertise with leadership development, mentorship, and real-world classroom preparation. Her work consistently centered on empowering educators to lead with purpose, creativity, and confidence.

Currently, Dr. Scherler serves as the Texas Mentorship Fellow and Texas Strategic Staffing Lead at the Region 9 Education Service Center in Wichita Falls, Texas. In this role, she leads a Texas Education Agency-funded statewide mentorship initiative designed to strengthen teacher development systems across districts. The program provides stipends and professional training for teacher mentors, helping schools implement structured, effective support systems for early-career educators. Her work is instrumental in improving teacher retention and building sustainable mentorship cultures throughout the state.

Beyond her leadership within public education, Dr. Scherler is also an International Coaching Federation member and an active volunteer with organizations such as The Kelly Way Foundation and the Mosaic Foundation. Her commitment to service extends beyond the classroom and into broader community development efforts, reflecting her belief in education as a lifelong and community-centered practice.

Dr. Scherler attributes her success to what she describes as “planting seeds.” Over decades of teaching, mentoring, and coaching, she has found deep fulfillment in witnessing former students and mentees grow into confident, successful individuals who remain connected over time. She believes that effective coaching empowers individuals to discover their own solutions, fostering transformation through reflection, insight, and personal growth rather than external instruction alone.

One of the most influential pieces of career advice she has received is the simple but powerful reminder that “sometimes you win — sometimes you learn.” Dr. Scherler has carried this philosophy throughout her professional journey, using it as a guiding framework for resilience, reflection, and continuous improvement. She views challenges not as setbacks, but as opportunities for growth and deeper understanding.

For young women entering education and leadership roles, Dr. Scherler emphasizes the importance of balancing personal expertise with a commitment to uplifting others. She encourages emerging professionals to focus not only on individual achievement but also on their ability to nurture, support, and empower those around them. She believes that leadership is most effective when it is rooted in service and shared growth.

Dr. Scherler also highlights coaching and mentoring as essential tools for expanding professional impact. She encourages educators to embrace these practices as a means of strengthening

leadership capacity, enhancing collaboration, and contributing meaningfully to the development of students, colleagues, and entire school communities.

Within the field of education, Dr. Scherler identifies teacher recruitment and retention—particularly in small and rural districts—as one of the most pressing challenges. She notes that early-career teachers often face significant difficulties, making structured mentorship critical for building confidence, improving instructional practice, and increasing long-term retention in the profession.

At the same time, she sees significant opportunity in emerging initiatives such as TEA-funded mentorship stipends and statewide training programs. These efforts, she explains, are helping to professionalize mentorship, strengthen support systems, and ensure that both new and experienced educators have access to meaningful, sustained development opportunities.

Across all areas of her work, Dr. Scherler is guided by core values of empowerment, lifelong learning, collaboration, creativity, and sensitivity in leading change. She is deeply committed to community service and advancing educational equity, consistently working to create systems that support both educators and students in reaching their full potential.
