potentially collect near the home's foundation. Cleaning gutters and ensuring downspouts direct water away from the structure helps improve drainage during periods of heavy rainfall.

Trees and landscaping deserve careful attention before hurricane season begins. Dead limbs, weakened branches, and overgrown trees located near the home may become hazards during high winds. Pruning damaged branches and removing unhealthy trees when necessary can help

reduce the likelihood of falling debris causing damage to roofs, windows, vehicles, or utility lines.

Windows and exterior doors should also be inspected for signs of wear or damage. Loose weatherstripping, deteriorated seals, damaged frames, or cracked glass may become vulnerable during severe storms.
