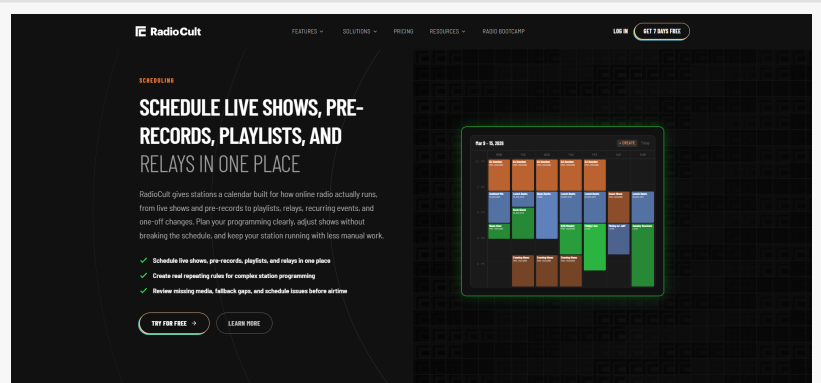


Radio Scheduling Software Comparison: What to Look For, According to RadioCult

Custom repeating schedules, AutoDJ, fallbacks, and error checks: the features that matter most when comparing radio scheduling and automation software.

RadioCult, an [online radio hosting platform](#) built for multi-presenter stations, has broken down what to look for when comparing radio scheduling and automation software, drawing on its own scheduling feature and educational guides.

At its core, [radio automation software](#) handles playlist and scheduling, so the right content plays at the right time and a station keeps broadcasting without someone pressing play. The most capable tools go further than a single playlist, combining live shows, pre-records, playlists, stream relays, and AutoDJ on one calendar.

The first thing worth comparing is how flexibly a tool handles recurring programming. Real radio schedules are rarely simple weekly loops. Useful options include daily, weekly, and monthly recurrence, complex patterns such as every third Thursday, multi-week rotations, and the ability to change a single episode without breaking the rest of the

series.

The second is what happens when something goes wrong. Dependable software includes fallback and loop options when content runs short, overrun handling with configurable limits, and error checks that flag missing media or empty playlists before airtime rather than during it.

"Scheduling is where a lot of stations get caught out," said a RadioCult spokesperson. "The software demos well, and then real programming turns out to be full of rotations, exceptions, and one-off changes. That is the part worth testing before committing."

The third is how well the tool supports a team. That covers calendar views by day, week, and month, drag-and-drop editing, event details such as linked artists and presenters, and filtering by tag or status. RadioCult's scheduling brings these together with live, pre-recorded, playlist, and relay scheduling, AutoDJ, per-event intros, and recording, all with unlimited concurrent listeners.

The right fit depends on how much programming a station runs and how many people touch the schedule, with multi-presenter and community stations usually needing the most flexibility. RadioCult's scheduling feature and its guide to radio automation software are available on its website.

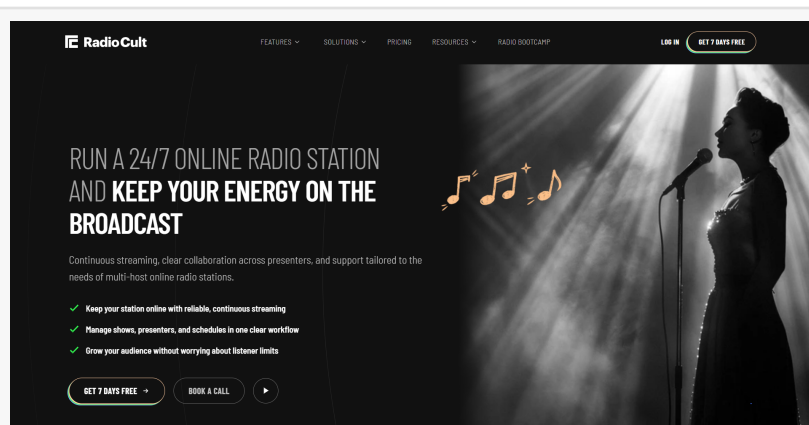
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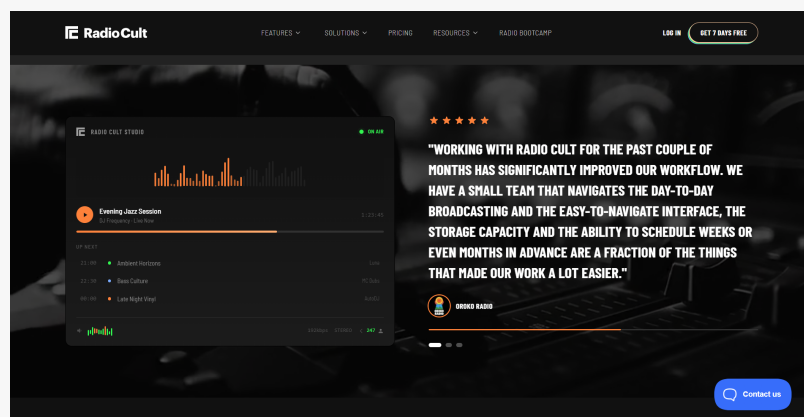
