For Restaurants, Prevention Is More Than a Good Idea

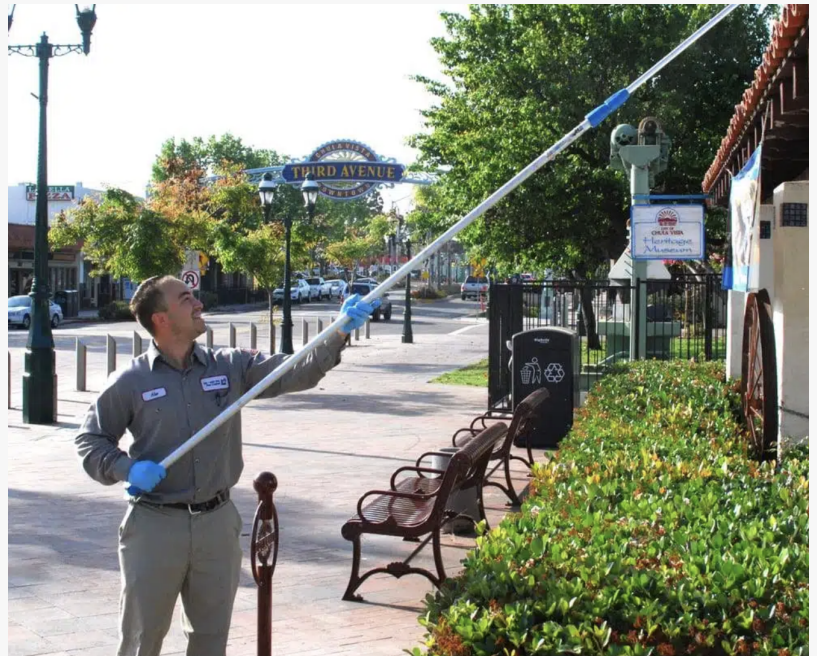
Restaurants face unique pest pressures. Food, moisture, deliveries, storage areas, dumpsters and constant activity can create an environment where pests find everything they need.
